2021 Prioritization and Budget

Each year, the City Commission convenes at the Fort Lauderdale Woman's Club for a Workshop to set our top priorities for the upcoming fiscal year. In previous years, the workshops were held over two days, but this year we condensed the workshop to a five-hour session. The Mayor and Commissioners shared and discussed their top concerns, producing the list below:

Our Top Priorities

Infrastructure

Sewer Mains, Water Mains, Stormwater, Seawalls

Transportation and Traffic

Affordable Housing and Homelessness

Downtown Masterplan and Comprehensive Plan Implementation

Water Quality of our Waterways

Sea-Level Rise and Resiliency

My recommendations were based on input from the community, through the accumulation of thousands of emails, letters, calls and conversations with residents over the year. Many of these initiatives were also the result of longer detailed discussions with District 2 Neighborhood Presidents, who provide an excellent grassroots perspective on how we can best move forward as a City. Throughout our discussions in District 2, we were able to prioritize several other goals, which I will advocate throughout the rest of the year:

Safety

Improving EMS response times and addressing streetlight outages (the number one complaint we receive) to ensure our communities are safe and secure.

Enforcement

From trash and broken fences to parking under "no parking signs" and liveaboards dumping into our canals, we need a better handle on enforcement to maintain clean and safe neighborhoods across the City. If we clean up our streets and treat our community with respect, our City will be something we can be proud of for generations to come.

Communications

We must continue to improve our communication efforts regarding City Projects and Budgets to provide transparency and information that is easy to digest on all of our initiatives.

Without input from people like you, our City Hall staff would not know how to prioritize their time, and what challenges we need to tackle together. The Goal Setting Workshop is just the “Kick-Off” to our Annual Budget Process where we will strive to align spending with our designated priorities. Below is a timeline of the budget planning process between now and September 2020, when the City Commission will vote to adopt the FY 2021 Budget. I would invite everyone to come join us, as the contributions of the community are the most important ingredient in bringing meaningful change to City Hall.

City Commission sets the maximum millage rate and non-ad valorem assessment rates to be sent by first class mail by the Broward County Property Appraiser on the TRIM notice – Tuesday, July 7

Joint Budget Advisory Board and City Commission Workshop – Tuesday, August 18

Two Public Hearings and the Adoption of the City Budget: September – dates to be determined and approved by the Commission based upon dates set by the School Board and Broward County.

If a person decides to appeal any decision made with respect to any matter considered at this public meeting or hearing, he/she will need to ensure that a verbatim record of the proceedings is made, which record includes the testimony and evidence upon which the appeal is to be based. Two Great Traditions Return to Fort Lauderdale on March 14!

St. Patrick's Celebration and Debut of Pro Soccer Highlight March

On Saturday, March 14, Fort Lauderdale celebrates the return of a legendary tradition – the St. Patrick's Parade and Festival and the home debut of Inter Miami CF, David Beckham's new Major League Soccer team!

The pageantry and excitement begins bright and early when thousands will gather at Huizenga Plaza (Las Olas and Andrews Avenue) at 7 a.m. for the annual Shamrock Run. Festivities will continue throughout the morning with live music and entertainment, and then, it's time for the largest St. Patrick's Parade in South Florida.

The St. Patrick's Parade begins at 11:00 a.m. this year and travels west along Las Olas

Boulevard from S.E. 5 Avenue through the heart of downtown Fort Lauderdale. The colorful parade will feature more than 100 decorative floats, pipe and drum corps, classic automobiles, bagpipers, marching bands, Irish dancers, street performers, scout troops, local sports teams, Veterans groups, and more.

Following the parade, don't miss the St. Patrick's Festival, which runs until 7 p.m. at Huizenga Plaza and along the Riverwalk. Highlights will include live bands, interactive entertainment, cultural attractions, a Kids Zone, and an exclusive performance by U2BYUV, the ultimate U2 tribute band. Saturday, March 14 also marks the opening of Major League Soccer (MLS) in Fort Lauderdale! At 2:30 p.m., Inter Miami CF will take the field for its inaugural home opener at the brand new, 18,000-seat professional soccer stadium located on the former site of Lockhart Stadium.

The historic game will match Inter Miami against the L.A. Galaxy, which happens to be David Beckham's former team. Beckham played for the Galaxy from 2007 - 2012, leading the club to back-to-back MLS Cup Championships in 2011 and 2012. The opening matchup should prove to be an exciting contest as Inter Miami boasts a host of talented young players led by a trio of 19-year-olds that includes Argentine midfielder Matías Pellegrini and forward Julián Carranza, along with Venezuelan defender Christian Makoun.

Inter Miami's debut marks a major milestone in the public/private partnership between the City of Fort Lauderdale and the Beckham group. Under the agreement, the Beckham group is investing \$60 million to transform the 64-acre Lockhart Stadium property into a soccer-centric community destination. In addition to the new soccer stadium, the complex will include a 50,000 square foot state-of-the-art soccer training center and seven professional fields. The facility will be home to Inter Miami's United Soccer League (USL) team and the Academy. It will also host international clubs, tournaments and local high school sporting events.

At the same time, exciting plans are moving forward for a signature community park that is also being funded and constructed by the Beckham group. The community destination will feature public gathering areas, open green space, shade structures, a dog park, playgrounds, multi-purpose fields, a walking/jogging/fitness trail, along with other amenities and ancillary facilities all for use by our community.

The City's partnership with the Beckham group breathes new life into this landmark property. It brings professional soccer back to our community; provides our youth with opportunities for expert coaching, training, and instruction; gives our City much-needed new parks and recreation areas, athletic fields, and stadium access; and ushers in the return of high school games and athletic events.

I'm excited to see the tremendous progress being made on this game-changing initiative that fulfills our shared vision of expanding green space and promoting active healthy lifestyles. It is truly a transformative project that will redefine the Uptown area of Fort Lauderdale and make a lasting impact on our community for generations to come.



Information for Election Day(s)

A Presidential Primary Election is held on the third Tuesday of March in a presidential election year. The Primary Election is held 11 weeks before the General Election for purposes of nominating party nominees to be voted for in the General Election to fill a national, state, county, or district office. A General Election is held in November of every even-numbered year. The election dates for 2020 are:

- Presidential Preference Primary Election: March 17
- Primary Election: August 18
- General Election: November 3

Note: Special elections may be called at any time during the year. Local elections may also be held throughout the year. Check the [Local Elections Database](#) which contain dates as

reported by the county for elections (county-specific, municipal, special district, or other local election) scheduled within one county. Contact your [county Supervisor of Elections](#) for the most up-to-date information.

Deadline to Register (Book Closing)

Eligible individuals can register to vote at any time. The deadline to register in order to participate in an upcoming election is 29 days before the election. The registration deadlines for 2020 are:

- Presidential Preference Primary Election: February 18*
- Primary Election: July 20
- General Election: October 5

*Federal holiday moves the deadline to the next business day

Vote-by-Mail Ballot 'Send' Deadline

For vote-by-mail ballot requests on record, state law requires that the ballots be sent during specified timeframes.

For absent stateside and overseas uniformed service member and overseas civilian voters (also known as UOCAVA voters), Supervisors of Elections send the ballots no later than 45 days before an election. The send periods for 2020 are:

- Presidential Preference Primary Election: February 1
- Primary Election: July 4
- General Election: September 19

For domestic voters, Supervisors of Elections send the ballots during a 7-day window between 40 and 33 days before an election. The send periods for 2020 are:

- Presidential Preference Primary Election: February 6 – 13
- Primary Election: July 9 - July 16
- General Election: September 24 – October 1

Early Voting Period

Broward County Early voting begins March 7th and ends March 15th. Voting is between the hours of 10am and 6pm.

The City's Comprehensive Plan provides the blueprint for orderly and sustainable land development over the next decade and beyond. It provides

the City with long-term direction through goals, objectives, and policies for future land use and serves as the basis for the City's zoning and land development regulations. An important component of the Comprehensive Plan is identifying the infrastructure and growth demands needed to support existing needs and future growth. The Comprehensive Plan contains elements that address future land use, housing, transportation, infrastructure, water supply, coastal management, conservation, parks and recreation, historic preservation, public school facilities, intergovernmental coordination, and capital improvements, and includes objectives and policies formulated to preserve and enhance community character.

At the January 21st Conference Meeting, the Urban Design and Planning Division of the Department of Sustainable Development provided a presentation to the City Commission with an overview of proposed amendments to the City's Comprehensive Plan Update "Advance Fort Lauderdale" and obtain City Commission comments and feedback. The next public hearing will be held during the February 18th City Commission Meeting.

CAN THE GREASE

Pouring cooking oil down the drain can lead to smelly and costly troubles ahead



Fats, oils and greases are the leading cause of sewer line clogs and sewer main overflows in Fort Lauderdale. Clogged sewer lines can back-up into houses, spill onto roadways and into our waterways, creating hazards for humans, fish and wildlife.

With improper disposal down the kitchen drain, greasy leftovers can quickly turn foul, leading to disruptive and smelly back-ups in the sanitary wastewater system.

PREVENT COSTLY PLUMBING REPAIRS:

- Pour cooking oils into old cans, milk containers or other packages and dispose in your black garbage cart.
- Use a paper towel to wipe dishes and pots to remove grease prior to washing.
- Place fat trimmings from meat in your black trash cart, not your garbage disposal.

If you observe a sewer spill from the City's sanitary wastewater system, report it immediately by calling 954-828-8000.

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HELP PREVENT SEWER OVERFLOWS IN YOUR HOME AND NEIGHBORHOOD!

NEVER FLUSH these items down the toilet:

- Tampons and other feminine hygiene products
- Baby Wipes/Wet Wipes/Cleaning Pads
- Dental Floss
- Q-tips/Cotton Balls
- Diapers
- Paper Towels/Tissues
- Hair
- Cigarette butts
- Condoms
- Kitty Litter



When flushed down the toilet, these items bind together and may cause sewage backups in homes, manhole overflows and failures at sewage pumping stations, costing thousands of dollars to repair.

Only human waste and toilet paper should be flushed. Even though some products such as wipes and baby diapers may claim to be flushable, they are not.

Everyone can be a potential contributor to sewer problems and a potential victim of those problems.

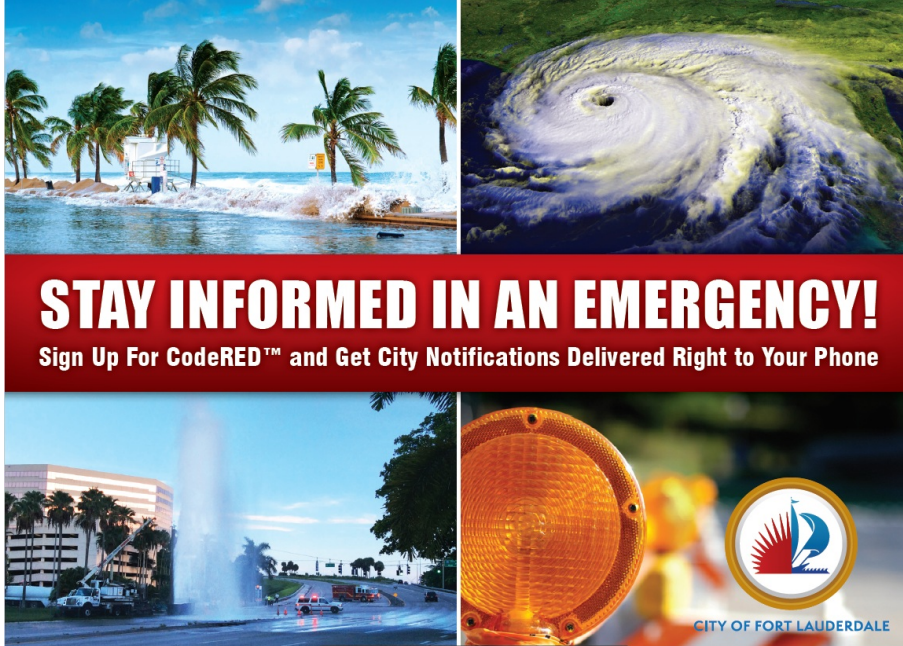

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Sign Up for CodeRED Stay Informed!

The City of Fort Lauderdale uses [CodeRED](#), a high-speed telephone notification system, to send mass notifications by phone, email and text to keep citizens informed. In the event of an evacuation, utility outage, water main break, fire or flood, chemical spill, or other emergency situation, the City may activate CodeRED to send emergency notifications to registered subscribers. The City may also use CodeRED to communicate non-life safety matters, such as planned road closures, water main repairs, water service interruptions, etc.

South Florida census takers will be paid \$17.50 an hour, the Census organization says. The Census is especially looking to recruit bilingual speakers in Palm Beach, Broward and Miami-Dade counties. The organization also needs clerical workers and field supervisors. For those hired, paid training begins in March and April. The actual door-to-door Census taking begins in early May, and is expected to conclude by early July.

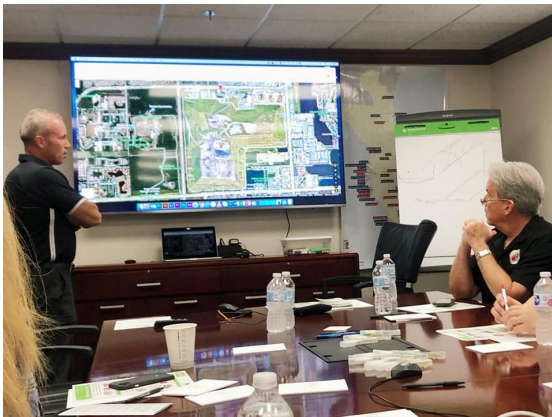
