- 3. Provide occupancy loads with compliant life safety egress design
- 4. Designate Fair Housing Provisions FBC Accessibility

- 6. Specify building separations correlating to FBC Table 601 and FBC Table 602.

GENERAL COMMENTS

The following comments are for informational purposes.

Please consider the following prior to submittal for Final DRC:

- 1. The Florida Building Code shall apply to the construction, alteration, movement, enlargement, replacement, repair, equipment, use and occupancy, location, maintenance, removal and demolition of every building or structure or any appurtenances connected or attached to such buildings or structures.
- 2. All projects must consider safeguards during the construction process. Florida Building Code Chapter 33 delineates various safeguards that may apply during the construction phase. All structures associated with the protection of pedestrians will require a separate permit. A licensed professional must sign and seal the plans and specifications.
- 3. The City of Fort Lauderdale is a participating municipality in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). The requirements specific to the City of Fort Lauderdale can be found in

Chapter 14 - FLOODPLAIN MANAGEMENT of the Code of Ordinances and accessed at;

Please consider the following prior to submittal for Building Permit:

- On January 1st, 2018 the 6th Edition of the Florida Building Code was adopted. All work described in Section 101.2, of the Broward County Administrative portion of the Florida Building Code, will govern the administration and enforcement of the proposed work. Each building and or structure will require a separate permit. The following websites will assist in the design considerations;

DEDICATION OF RIGHTS-OF-WAY: Per ULDR Section 47-25.2.M.5, property shall be conveyed to the public by plat, deed or grant of easement as needed in accordance with the Broward County Trafficways Plan, the city's comprehensive plan, subdivision regulations and accepted applicable traffic engineering standards:

a. Provide 10' x 15' (min.) permanent Utility Easement for any 4 Inch or larger water meter and/or the first private sanitary sewer manhole located within the proposed development (for City Maintenance access); show / label delineation in the plans as appropriate.

Prior to Planning and Zoning Board Meeting sign-off, please provide updated plans and written response to the following review comments:

- Meet the City's Adequacy requirements to services provided to the public (fire service, water, wastewater, stormwater, transportation, etc.), per ULDR Section 47-25.2 of the City's Code of Ordinances. Assess potential demands and impacts on City services and prepare a design for each that utilizes existing water, wastewater, stormwater, and transportation infrastructure to adequately serve this project. If the adequate infrastructure is not available, prepare a design that extends/expands the connection to the nearest City system to adequately serve this development.
 - a. Prepare service demand calculations for water & wastewater services and obtain a letter of service availability from the City's Public Works Engineering Department. Submit water and wastewater capacity availability request form and documents/ plans at https://www.fortlauderdale.gov/departments/sustainable-development/building-services/engineering-forms-and-info/development-review-committee-service-demand-calculations-for-water-se
- 2. Provide a current signed and sealed boundary and topographic survey showing all above ground improvements, utilities, rights of way dimensions and all easements. This survey shall be based on a Standard Title Commitment issued by a title insurer licensed to do business in Florida or an Opinion of Title issued by an attorney admitted to the Florida Bar. The title commitment or Opinion of Title must have an effective date no more than thirty days prior to the date of submittal of the survey and must be certified to the City of Fort Lauderdale. If any encumbrances are found in the property, provide a copy of the recorded documents accordingly (i.e. easements, dedications, agreements, vacations, etc.).

Property lines, NVAL, Right-of-Way, watercourses, easements, structures, and roadway shall be clearly shown, labeled and dimensioned. Provide spot elevations on site, at property corners, along property lines (50' min. interval), existing roadway crowns and pavement edges adjacent to property as appropriate. Elevations shall be referenced to the North American Vertical Datum of 1988 (NAVD 88). Sufficient information must be provided on survey in order to staff to determine proposed development improvements are being coordinated with adjacent right of way and properties.

Please provide boundary survey that is based on Standard Title Commitment or Opinion of Title.

Ensure survey depicts all information requested above as well as any information beyond limits of property that maybe required for coordination between existing and proposed improvements adjacent to the site.



- 3. Discuss status of existing encumbrances such as easements (including whether public or private) shown on ALTA / NSPS Land Title Survey: Vacation of any platted Utility Easement or right of way would require a separate DRC submittal, DRC staff support, and City Commission approval.
- 4. Provide disposition of existing utilities on-site and within the adjacent right of way that maybe impacted by the proposed development. Label information on plans (i.e. utility to remain/ be relocated/ removed). Provide correspondence from utility owner (as applicable) and depict any additional requirements they may have on plan (i.e. easements). Utilities include but are not limited to above and underground water, sewer, drainage, electrical, communications, light/power poles, down guys, fire hydrants, manholes, etc.
- 5. Spot elevations/grades shown in proposed development plans shall be per North American Vertical Datum of 1988 (NAVD 88), instead of National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 (NGVD 29).
- 6. Clearly indicate on plans the limits of construction and how the proposed improvements will transition into the existing (on-site and off-site) as applicable.
- 7. Per ULDR Section 47-19.3 (Seawall Ordinance): the top of seawall for redeveloped property shall be between elevation 3.9 feet NAVD88 (minimum height) and FEMA base flood elevation for the property (maximum height) except as described under ULDR Section 47-19.3.f; allowance for fixed docks to extend 10 inches above the adjacent seawall; allowance for floating docks and requirement that they be permitted and permanently attached. Confirm location of existing seawall and dock relative to property boundary fronting waterway.
- 8. Discuss dumpster enclosure/ trash pick-up access requirements with case planner and waste management. Clearly depict trash enclosure on site plan. Show truck turning movements in and out the proposed dumpster enclosure/ building as applicable. Ensure sufficient height clearance is provided within garage for truck access. Per ULDR Section 47-19.4.D.6, all dumpster enclosures and adjacent service access drive shall be placed on poured concrete, solid or perforated interlocking concrete block paving (ICB), or any existing hardened paving system.
- 9. Per the City's Code of Ordinances Section 25-56(c), sidewalks shall be required in connection with the development of vacant property, redevelopment of developed property or construction of improvements on developed property to the extent of twenty-five (25) percent or more of the replacement value of existing improvements; they shall be constructed on all public streets abutting the plot, except as provided in the above section, and such sidewalks shall be constructed to standards established by the City Engineer and located as determined by the City Engineer, generally at the edge of the right-of-way. However, if one or more of the exceptions stated in the above section are found to exist, then the property owner can request a sidewalk waiver by providing justification in a letter to the City.
- 10. Existing public sidewalks adjacent to proposed development (to remain) must be inspected by Engineer of Record to ensure existing sidewalks meet ADA standards and are in good condition. A signed and sealed assessment must be provided indicating sidewalks were inspected and any sidewalk replacement requirements. Plans shall reflect extent of sidewalk replacement accordingly.
- 11. Depict existing sidewalk adjacent to the development along Isles of Venice Drive and how proposed sidewalk/ pedestrian path will transition into existing sidewalk.
- 12. Continue concrete sidewalk (or other specialty hardscape sidewalk paving as shown) across and delineate with FDOT's 'Curbed Roadway Flared Turnouts' standard detail (Index 515 Sheet No. 2 of 7) for all proposed driveway access points (i.e. Parking Garage, Loading Zone, etc.).



- 13. Per ULDR Section 47-20.17, show and label on Site Plan the Vehicle Reservoir Spaces (VRS) required for the proposed development a minimum 10' x 20' area for each vehicle to be accommodated for the temporary stopping of a vehicle awaiting service, which shall be located in an area within a parking facility which is not used for any other vehicular use such as access, parking, site circulation or loading. Each VRS shall be in a location that does not conflict or interfere with other traffic entering, using or leaving the site; design configuration shall be such that there shall be no backing into the street permitted.
- 14. For surface or ground-level parking lot layout:
 - a. Show and label total number of parking stalls, dimension areas including drive aisle widths, and typical parking stall width/depth.
 - b. Per ULDR Section 47-20.11.A, drive aisle width shall be 24' (min.) adjacent to 90-degree angle parking stalls, 18' (min.) adjacent to 60-degree angled parking stalls, 13' (min.) adjacent to 45-degree angled parking stalls, and 12' (min.) adjacent to 30-degree angled parking stalls.
 - c. The minimum clear width and depth parking stall dimensions shall be 8'-8" and 18'-0", respectively, and shall not be encroached upon by building columns.
- 15. Depict proposed building doors and provide sufficient grades/details on conceptual paving, grading and drainage plans to verify ADA accessibility design for the site, especially ground floor access to the new building, as well as crossing proposed driveways and connecting to existing sidewalks (at intersections and with adjacent property) as appropriate; coordinate proposed site grading and 1st Level Finished Floor Elevations to meet ADA accessibility requirements.
- 16. Proposed trees shall be installed a min. 4 feet behind proposed curbs when adjacent to travel lanes and a min. 6 feet away from adjacent travel lanes when no curb is present.
- 17. Within adjacent City Right-of-Way, staging/storage will not be allowed, construction fence shall not encroach within intersection corner sight triangles, construction fence gates shall not swing into the public Right-of-Way, and any loaded Jib Crane radius shall not extend beyond private property boundaries. Any City Right-of-Way closure over 72 hours requires a Revocable License Agreement, processed by Property Right-Of-Way Committee (DRC) and approved by the City's Commission, prior to Right-of-Way permit issuance by the Department of Sustainable Development for Maintenance of Traffic.

Prior to submitting Administrative Review (i.e. DRC Level I) application to request Revocable License Agreement, please contact Dennis Girisgen at 954-828-5123 or <u>dgirisgen@fortlauderdale.gov</u> to discuss proposed scope of closure within City Right-of-Way.

- 18. Discuss if pedestrian lighting is proposed; if not, discuss the possibility of the addition of pedestrian lighting along City Right-of-Way, which requires perpetual maintenance by the Applicant via a Maintenance Agreement executed with the City. Please contact the Case Planner for details to match the area.
- 19. Provide Maintenance Agreement Area Exhibit, which provides a visual representation of the area within the adjacent public Right-of-Way (adjacent to the proposed development) to be maintained in perpetuity by the developer. Label whether the adjacent Right-of-Way is FDOT, BCHCED, or City jurisdiction, as well as label all proposed improvements, including asphalt and other specialty paving, specialty sidewalks, landscaping, irrigation, lighting, curb and gutter etc. that will be maintained by the Applicant throughout the life of the improvements.
- 20. Conceptual Paving, Grading, and Drainage Plan:



- a. Drainage mitigation shall be required for any impacts within the adjacent City Right-of-Way such as increased runoff or reduction of existing storage/treatment due to proposed improvements, in accordance with the City of Fort Lauderdale Comprehensive Plan (Ordinance C-15-08), Objective 4.1 under Infrastructure Elements. Engineer of Record (EOR) shall evaluate the adjacent City roadway system capacity and demonstrate that the proposed improvements will not negatively impact the City's existing drainage system and provide recommendations in compliance with the City's Comprehensive Plan (i.e. meets or exceeds the 10-year/1-day storm event drainage criteria). Applicant shall be responsible for maintenance of these proposed storm drain infrastructure improvements located within City Right-of-Way during a 1-year warranty period, until accepted by the City's Public Works Department. (coordinate as appropriate with the respective FDOT and BCHCED agencies for mitigation of additional runoff within those jurisdictions).
- b. Additional coordination maybe required for projects located within Victoria Park, Edgewood, Progresso Village, River Oaks, Durrs, Historical Dorsey-Riverbend and South East Isles neighborhoods which are part of a City Drainage Master Plan. Please contact Rares Petrica (Public Works) at 954-828-6720 or <u>rpetrica@fortlauderdale.gov</u>.
- 21. Provide storm runoff calculations, signed and sealed by a Florida registered professional engineer, which demonstrate how minimum criteria regarding adjacent street crown, water quality and finished floor elevations are met, as well as how the 25-year, 3-day storm event is maintained on site with zero discharge to Right-of-Way and adjacent properties (Pre vs. Post analysis will only be allowed in areas that are not flood-prone). Please also comply with the City of Fort Lauderdale Comprehensive Plan (Ordinance C-08-18), Objective 4.1 under Infrastructure Elements, and be advised that effective 7/1/2017, all projects must comply with the Broward County 'Future Conditions Average Wet Season Groundwater Level' map.
- 22. If dewatering activities are anticipated, a notarized City dewatering affidavit shall be filed at City's building department when submitting a demolition or foundation permit along with any applicable dewatering permit form regulatory agencies such as the South Florida Water Management District or Broward County Department of Environmental Protection.
- 23. Exfiltration Trenches:
 - a. Provide at least a clean out structure at each end of exfiltration trench located within the property.
- 24. Show and label all existing and proposed utilities (utility type, material and size) on civil and landscaping plans for potential conflict. A min. 5 feet and 10 feet horizontal clearance horizontal separation is required between city utilities infrastructure and proposed small and large trees, respectively (including proposed water and sewer services to the development). Any new trees (located within or adjacent to City Right-of-Way) should be placed with sufficient horizontal and vertical distances (per City, County, and State guidelines) to / from City's public infrastructure, including stormwater assets, to allow for continued Public Works maintenance without obstruction. If this cannot be accommodated due to field conditions, then the developer shall relocate the existing City's public infrastructure to resolve the conflict(s) and to comply with City's, County's & State's engineering standards/permits/policies. Ensure separation is provided and include a note regarding horizontal clearance requirement on the landscape plans.
- 25. Discuss how surface runoff from the proposed development (between building and Right-of-Way boundaries) will be mitigated such that it won't be conveyed into the adjacent existing public storm drain infrastructure or waterways, and whether additional infrastructure will be required within City Right-of-Way. Show location of building roof drains, and their proposed connection(s) to the on-site drainage system.

CASE COMMENTS:

Please provide a response to the following:

- 1. The City has adopted Florida Friendly Landscaping requirements into our ULDR Section 47-21. This basically means that plant material must be grouped together based on watering needs (hydro zone) and turf areas must be limited and/or consolidated to less than 50% of the landscaped area. Plant material species must be minimum 50% Florida Friendly Landscaping. Planting areas are to be irrigated on a separate zone than the turf areas so that once the plants are established, that particular zone can be shut off based on the season. The overall goal is to decrease water use through irrigation. Illustrate hydro zones on planting plan, and include calculations in table.
- 2. The use of structural soil is required in paved sites to provide adequate soil volumes for tree roots under pavements, as per ULDR Section 47-21.13. Structural soil details and specifications can be obtained at http://www.hort.cornell.edu/uhi/outreach/index.htm#soil This is to be provided at a minimum of 8' radii of tree trunks, and is to be consistently illustrated and noted on landscape, site and civil plans.

The structural soil drain is required when percolation rates are less than 4" vertical clearance per hour. Provide documentation of report used to prove this calculation. The drain and connections are to be illustrated on civil plans.

- a. Demonstrate hashing on landscape, site and civil plans as to the extent of use of the Structural Soil.
- b. Provide Structural Soil Detail and composition.

There is a product that the Landscape Department will approve the use of in place of Structural soil. With the Structural soil repositioning of the underground utilities is required. A suspension modular paving system product will provide the required root development area for a healthy and vibrant tree, along with their use it will allow the utilities to be in place and not affect their location in conjunction with the tree's root system. Please look into the use of the Green Blue Urban soil cell, Silva cell or like product for this and all future site developments.

As with the use of Structural soil a detail of the product and indication of the extent of use to be provided of the soil cell pavement support systems product.

- a. When large shade trees are within 4-5 feet from the sidewalk the Department will ask for structural soil or like product to be proposed for the root area of the tree. If the tree is 6 feet from the sidewalk and has the horizontal clearance of 15 feet from the structure, root barrier may be proposed in place of the structural soil or like product under the paved sidewalk.
 - 3. Provide street trees in the right of way swale area, as per ULDR 47-21.13.B.16. Street trees are to be a minimum of 12 feet tall and provided at a ratio of one street tree per forty feet of street frontage or greater fraction thereof not subtracting ingress and egress dimensions. When overhead utilities exist, required street trees may be small trees provided at a minimum of a



ratio of one street tree per twenty feet frontage or greater fraction thereof not subtracting ingress and egress dimensions.

- a. The isles of Las Olas have a history of having Royal palms as street trees. While the Live Oak trees provide shade for the public realm and work towards site code requirements, the Department is asking that Royal palms be proposed within the right of way swale area. The Department considers Royal palms to cover the same amount of frontage as smaller maturing trees, but strategically placed the Department views that 5-6 Royal palms may be proposed. Please propose the Royal palms with 10-12 feet minimum of gray wood.
- 4. A minimum separation of 6 feet is required between the tree trunk and travel lane when curb and gutter DO NOT exist, and a minimum separation of 4 feet is required between the tree trunk and travel lane when curb and gutter DO exist. Illustrate this clearance.
- 5. Utilities and site amenities such as walkways, flagpoles, transformers, fire hydrants, sewer and water supply lines, trash enclosures, and similar items located on the site shall not be placed adjacent to, in, or under required tree planting areas, as per ULDR Section 47-21.12. Confirm with civil, site and life safety plans that utilities and site amenities are not causing conflicts with proposed landscaping. Where conflicts exist, please shift the proposed utility and/or site amenities to allow for code required trees.
- 6. Illustrate and label the horizontal clearance from tree trunk to edge of the off-site utility on the landscape plan. Landscaping must provide a minimum horizontal clearance of 5 feet for small trees and palms, and a minimum of 10 feet for large trees and palms from underground utilities. Provide a cross section detail to illustrate this clearance.
- 7. Provide an existing tree site plan or existing tree site survey illustrating all existing trees and palms, and number each one.
- 8. Provide a corresponding list, as per ULDR 47-21.15, of these trees/palms including:
 - a. tree number for each
 - b. botanical name and common name for each
 - c. trunk diameter, in inches, at chest height for trees
 - d. clear trunk in feet for palms
 - e. condition percentage as a number for each
 - f. indicate status for all existing trees/palms on site (remain, relocate, remove)
- 9. For specimen size trees, provide ISA Certified Arborist report for specimen trees, as per ULDR 47-21.15. This report is to be on ISA Certified Arborist business letterhead with contact information and ISA Certification number clearly stated. This report would include tree survey with numbered trees, a corresponding table which includes tree number, botanical name and common name, trunk diameter at breast height, clear trunk for palms, condition percentage, etc.; and a written assessment of existing tree characteristics. This information is required to calculate equivalent value mitigation.
- 10. Please have a certified ISA Arborist provide the information as to the existing trees including the condition ratings that will be required for mitigation purposes.
- 11. As shown on the Landscape plan the site is not meeting the minimum landscape area of 35%. Please provide an overlay sheet that demonstrates all landscape areas with their measured square footage.



- 12. "CL" plant species and height is not identified on the plant list.
 - a. In order to maintain sight visibility, no opaque hedge shall be permitted to exceed 30 inches within 10 feet of the edge of waterway as per ULDR 47-19.5. Provide appropriate species, or shift plant material out of this area if needed. Illustrate this area and state this note on the plan.

GENERAL COMMENTS

The following comments are for informational purposes.

Please consider the following prior to submittal for Building Permit:

- 1. A separate sub-permit application for Tree Removal, Relocation, and General Landscaping for site is required at time of master permit submittal. These are Landscape and Tree permit application documents different than the Broward County standard applications. Please not at this time of DRC submittal.
- Proposed landscaping work in the City's right of way requires engineering permit and approval (GLandscape permit). This approval requires documents to be submitted for Engineering review. Note that Landscape will not approve permit review without these Engineering documents being submitted.
- 3. Provide separate Plumbing sub permit application for irrigation. Irrigation plans are required at time of Building permit submittal. Plans are to be in compliance with ULDR 47-21.6.A.11 and 47-21.10. Note that planting areas are to be irrigated on a separate zone than the turf areas so that once the plants are established, that particular zone can be shut off based on the season. The overall goal is to decrease water use through irrigation. Plant material must be grouped together based on watering needs (hydrozone) and turf areas must be limited and/or consolidated to less than 50% of the landscaped area. Illustrate hydrozones on planting plan and include calculations in table.



CASE COMMENTS:

Please provide a response to the following:

- 1. Entry doors should be solid, impact-resistant or metal.
- 2. Residential units entry doors should be equipped with a quality secondary deadbolt locking system and have a 180-degree peephole or viewport for security.
- 3. Sliding glass doors and sliding glass windows should be equipped with burglary deterrent features such as track blocks, door pins or deadbolts. The door should also provide features to prevent the doors from being lifted off the track.
- 4. All glazing should be impact resistant.
- 5. Units should be pre-wired for an alarm system.
- 6. Ground-level stair doors should be egress only or access controlled. Stair doors into floors should be access controlled.
- 7. The site should be equipped with a comprehensive CCTV system that is capable of retrieving an identifiable image of an individual on-site. The system should cover all entry-exit points, parking area, common areas, storage areas and any other area of concern on site.
- 8. The parking area resident's levels should be equipped with vehicular access control systems to prevent unauthorized intrusion or access to resident's vehicles.
- 9. The pool area should be equipped with a childproof access control feature to prevent unsupervised children access to the pool.
- 10. Lighting and landscaping should follow C.P.T.E.D. guidelines.

GENERAL COMMENTS

It is highly recommended that the managing company make arrangements for private security during construction.

Please provide a response to the following:

- 1. Garbage, Recycling and Bulk Trash shall be provided.
- 2. Recycling reduces the amount of trash your business creates and it is the best way to reduce monthly waste disposal costs and improve your company's bottom line.
- 3. Solid Waste Services shall be provided by a Private Contractor licensed by the City.
- 4. Service Days shall be: No restriction for Commercial collection. Service may not occur earlier than 7:00 am or later than 10:00 pm within 250 feet of residential.
- 5. Containers: must comply with 47-19.4
- 6. Solid Waste transport to trash rooms or to primary waste container shall be performed inside building using interior service corridor (Retail, Office, Condo, Hotel).
- 7. Containers shall not be stored curbside and shall be removed immediately after collection.
- 8. Provide letter from chute company indicating make and model of proposed equipment and that it will meet the capacity needs of building.
- 9. Trash Room services will be handled by private collector, or Trash Room services will be done by on site personnel, or Trash Room services will be done by custodial staff.
- 10. Provide on the site plan a garbage truck turning radii for City review. Indicate how truck will circulate within property.
- 11. Submit a Solid Waste Management Plan on your letterhead containing name of project, address, DRC case number, number of units if applicable, and indicate whether it is Pre or Final DRC.
 - This letter is to be approved and signed off by the Sustainability Division, and should be 0 attached drawings. Please email electronic to your an CODY to smccutcheon@fortlauderdale.gov. Letter should include an analysis of the expected amounts of solid waste and recyclables that will be generated (if different from current capacity), and container requirements to meet proposed capacity.
 - Community Inspections will reference this Solid Waste Plan for sanitation compliance issues at this location.

- 1. Submit a traffic impact statement and coordinate with the Transportation and Mobility Department regarding traffic calming and a traffic impact study if needed. If a traffic study is needed Pursuant to ULDR Section 47-25.2.M.4, the Applicant must fund the City's review by an outside consultant and pay a \$4,000 deposit prior to scheduling a methodology meeting after which the study will be prepared, transmitted and reviewed by the City's consultant. Staff and consultant's review concerns shall be adequately resolved prior to gaining authorization for either the Planning & Zoning Board or City Commission hearings. Take into consideration that the review of this study, once submitted, will take about 4-6 weeks once all documents are received.
- 2. Dimension all parking stalls (including the ADA accessible parking stall) and aisle along the ADA space and ensure the stalls and aisle meet our city code's geometrics standards as well as ADA guidelines. At least one handicap parking space needs to follow the guidelines for van accessibility.
- 3. Adjust the design of the parking spaces on the west side of the parking garage so that the ADA accessible parking space can have a larger width.
- 4. Per ULDR Section 47-20.2, seventeen (17) parking spaces are required for this development. There are only fourteen (14) parking spaces being provided. Please update the plan sheets to reflect the correct number of provided parking spaces. This proposal is not eligible for a parking reduction.
- 5. Ensure all access points, sidewalks, walkways, and curb cuts are unobstructed and ADA accessible with appropriate slopes and detectible warning devices and indicate on the site plan.
- 6. Per ULDR Section 47-2.2.Q, show and label sight triangles as appropriate for safe and adequate access of drivers and pedestrians on the Site Plan, Landscape Plans and Civil Plans: intersections of driveways with streets and alleys (10' measured from intersection point of pavement edges), alleys with alleys (15' measured from intersection point of extended property lines), alleys with streets (15' measured from intersection point of extended property lines), and streets with streets (25' measured from intersection point of extended property lines). The request for reduction of sight triangle dimensions is subject to review by the City Engineer on a case by case basis. Per ULDR Section 47-19.1.E, no accessory use or structures shall be permitted within a sight triangle except as provided in ULDR Section 47-35.
- 7. Please show inbound and outbound stacking requirements from the property line to the first conflict point according to Section 47-20.5 General design of parking facilities for the driveway. Gate house or gated entryways require additional stacking and vehicular reservoir space.
- 8. If stacking requirement cannot be met, submit a signed and sealed traffic impact statement justifying why the stacking requirement should be reduced.
- 9. Additional comments may be provided upon further review.
- 10. Signature required.

- 1. The City's Transportation & Mobility Department encourages the use of sustainable materials such as permeable pavement and electric car charge stations and installation of multimodal facilities such as bicycle pump stations and bike lockers.
- 2. Please note that any work within the City's right-of-way will require an MOT approved by Transportation and Mobility and Engineering for permitting. Any full closures of roadways, alleys, or sidewalks that are over 72 hours will require a Revocable License Agreement (RLA) with the City of Fort Lauderdale.

- The applicant is strongly encouraged to contact neighbors adjacent to, as well as condominium and neighborhood associations located within three hundred feet (300') of the development site, to advise of this proposal (a listing of officially-recognized associations is provided on the City's website: www.fortlauderdale.gov/neighbors/civic-associations and a map of neighborhood associations may be found at: <u>http://gis.fortlauderdale.gov</u>). Please provide acknowledgement and/or documentation of any public outreach.
- 2) The site is designated Medium-High Residential on the City's Future Land Use Map. The proposed use is permitted in this designation. This is not a determination on consistency with Comprehensive Plan Goals, Objectives and Policies.
- 3) The proposed project requires review and approval by the Planning and Zoning Board. A separate application and fee are required for PZ Board submittal, and the applicant is responsible for all public notice requirements (Sec. 47-27). In addition, the development permit shall not take effect nor shall a building permit be issued until thirty (30) days after approval, and then only if no motion is adopted by the City Commission seeking to review the application.

This application is subject to Unified Land Development Regulations (ULDR) Section 47-27.4.A.2.c, Public Participation requirements. Prior to submittal of the application to the Planning and Zoning Board (PZB), a notice from the applicant via letter or e-mail shall be provided to official city-recognized civic organization(s) within 300 feet of the proposed project, notifying of the date, time and place of applicant's project presentation meeting to take place prior to the PZB meeting.

The applicant shall then conduct a public participation meeting(s) a minimum of 30 days prior to the PZB. This date and location of the meeting is at the discretion of the applicant. Once the meeting(s) is/are conducted, the applicant shall provide a written report letter to the Department of Sustainable Development, with copy to subject association(s), documenting the date(s), time(s), location(s), number of participants, presentation material and general summary of the discussion after a public participation meeting(s). The report letter shall summarize the substance of comments expressed during the process and shall be made a part of the administrative case file record.

The applicant shall, 10 days prior to the PZB, execute and submit to the department an affidavit of proof of public notice according to this section. If the applicant fails to submit the affidavit, the public hearing will be postponed until the next available hearing date after the affidavit has been supplied.

- 4) Verify that copy of plat is the most current recorded plat, including notes and amendments, for the proposed site. Provide documentation from the Broward County Planning Council verifying that the site does not require platting or replatting. If replatting or platting is <u>not</u> required, contact the Development Review Services Section of the Planning and Environmental Regulation Division of Broward County at (954) 357-6637 to ensure that proposed project is consistent with the latest recorded plat restriction.
- 5) Please contact Jean-Paul Perez, Broward County Planning and Development Division at <u>JPPerez@broward.org</u> or 954-357-6637 to ensure the proposed plat note language meets their standards before moving forward. Please provide staff with written response from the County.



- 6) Pursuant to ULDR, Section 47-23.8, a twenty (20) foot landscaped yard is required adjacent to the existing bulkhead line. The required 20-foot yard shall not be used or developed for any purpose other than landscaping and the minimum amount of driveways or walkways reasonably necessary to serve the waterfront uses, unless specifically approved by the Planning and Zoning Board. The proposed encroachment into the 20-foot landscape area will require approval by the Planning and Zoning Board. Please indicate in the project narrative response the exact amount of the landscape area that will be provided along the waterfront.
- 7) Provide legible photometric plan for the entire site. Extend values on photometric plans to all property lines. Show values pursuant to the Unified and Land Development Regulations ("ULDR"), Section 47-25.3.A.3.a and 47-20.14. Indicate lighting poles on site plan and landscape plan and provide detail with dimensions. Garage internal lighting fixtures and glare cannot be visible from neighboring properties.
- 8) Applicant shall provide additional screening within the garage to shield interior garage lighting and install shielding material along the all elevation facing the waterway and neighboring properties.
- 9) Clarify proposed height in the site data chart on page A000 and in the narrative to indicate how the project meets the maximum 55-foot structure requirement for the RMM-25 district.
- 10) The exterior stairs at the upper level of the structure are encroaching into the required yard, the yard modification request must include the measurement to the stairs at the upper levels of the project. Stairs at the ground floor are permitted to encroach into the required yard.
- 11) Provide the following on the site plan:
 - a) Indicate bulkhead line and setbacks from the bulkhead line to pool, balcony and building façade.
 - b) Consider consolidating parking under the building and removing front wall in requested reduced side yard to provide view to the water and reduce the visual impact of the parking area to enhance the pedestrian experience.
 - c) Verify provided parking; it appears several spaces are not accounted for in the garage.
 - d) Provide dimension of drive aisle width at property line.
 - e) Provide location of all mechanical equipment proposed on the ground level.
- 12) Provide the following on the roof plan:
 - a) Remove elevator foyer/lobby located on the roof.
 - b) Provide measurements to the top of the screening on the roof.
 - c) Screening panels should be no higher than 6 inches to properly conceal the mechanical equipment.
 - d) Reduce the 4-foot high wall located behind the "summer kitchen", no structure or wall shall exceed 42-inches in height.
 - e) Provide a detailed emergency evacuation plan for the roof furniture including, hot tubs, BBQ grills, shading devices and seating areas. These items must not be affixed to the roof or parapet walls.
- 13) The proposed trellis structure must be included in the Waterway Use request as it is located within the 20foot yard. Please include the measurements from the bulkhead line to the trellis on the site plan.
- 14) Provide the following on the elevation plans:
 - a) Adjust height to maximum 55-foot structure height in the RMM-25 district.
 - b) Consider removing the cladding element at the top of the elevator shaft.
 - c) Consider providing a lighter color palette under the roof to reduce heat impact and.



- d) Show setback dimensions from the property lines and/or bulkhead line to all architectural elements and building facade.
- 15) Provide the proposed fence and gate dimensions, photographic example of proposed material and color on the detail plan sheet. Fence and gate should provide a high level of opacity in order to allow a view of the water from the pedestrian perspective on both the rear and front of the property.
- 16) Coordinate with the Floodplain Manager, Richard Benton, for floodplain inquires. (Email: <u>RBenton@fortlauderdale.gov</u>, Phone: 954-828-6133). Section 60.3(c)(3) of the NFIP regulations states that a community shall:
 - (1) "Require that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures within Zones AI-A30, AE, and AH on the community's FIRM (i) have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the base flood level, or (ii) together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, be designed so that below the base flood level the structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water and with structural components having the capability of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and effects of buoyancy."
 - (2) Below-grade parking garages are permitted beneath non-residential buildings in Zones A1-A30, AE, and AH provided the building (including the parking garage) is floodproofed to the base flood level in accordance with the design performance standards provided above in Section 60.3(c)(3)(ii). Only below-grade parking garages in non-residential buildings that are dry floodproofed are permitted under the NFIP.
 - (3) Guidance on floodproofing is provided in the FEMA manual "Floodproofing Non-Residential Structures" and in Technical Bulletin 3, "Non-Residential Floodproofing Requirements and Certification."
- 17) If application proposes additional dockage and/or boat slips, provide an approval letter from the Broward County Environmental Protection Department, contact Julie Krawczyk (954-519-1266) prior to Planning and Zoning Board submittal.
- 18) Discuss all newly proposed seawalls, any repair to existing seawalls and/or re-location of existing seawalls with Engineering Representative.
- 19) The City's Vision is to support sustainable infrastructure. Consider employing green building practices throughout the project such as, but not limited to; charging stations, tank-less water heaters, rain collection systems, pervious pavement where appropriate, bio-swales, Florida Friendly[™] plant materials, solar panels and green roofs.
- 20) This project is subject to the requirements of Broward County Public School Concurrency. The applicant will notify the School Board Superintendent or designee of this proposal. Prior to submitting an application for placement on a Planning and Zoning Board or City Commission agenda, a written response from the School Board shall be provided by the applicant. Prior to application for final DRC approval, please provide confirmation from the School District that the residential development is exempt or vested from the requirements of public school concurrency, or a School Capacity Availability Determination (SCAD) letter that confirms that capacity is available, or if capacity is not available, that mitigation requirements have been satisfied. The City cannot accept a building permit application, nor issue a building permit, for new or additional residential units, unless the applicant presents evidence from Broward County that the impact of the proposed development on public educational sites and facilities has been mitigated by payment of school impact fees.


