Re: Central City Redevelopment Area Capital Improvement Project Status Update -(Commission Districts 2 and 3)

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update on the Capital Improvement Project (CIP) planning efforts for the Central City Redevelopment Area.

On January 9, 2024, the CRA Board of Commissioners discussed the return of Central City CRA fund balance of \$2,334,39. A decision was made to only allocate \$93,359 for the Florida Power and Light streetlight project and hold off on approving the reallocation of the fund balance total of \$2,241,000, until the Central City Redevelopment Advisory Board (CCRAB) and neighborhood associations provide feedback on expenditure preferences.

On February 22, 2024, the CCRAB held a special workshop to discuss fund balance reallocation to Non-Residential Incentive Programs and Capital Improvement Projects. A presentation titled 'Working Towards Capital Improvement Plan' provided the following topics:

- Powers of the CRA and dos and don'ts of CRAs.
- An overview of recommended improvements identified in the Central City Redevelopment Plan (the Plan).
- An overview of existing improvement needs and data gathered through the years, through various efforts.
- Reallocation of fund balance, and prioritization of project types, such as: roadway lighting, traffic calming improvements, underground utilities, pedestrian pathways/sidewalks, landscaping, and gateway markers was held.

The advisory board members supported staff's recommendation to allocate \$941,000 to incentive programs, and \$1,300,000 to capital improvement projects. The advisory board was also made aware that CIP funds would cover design and construction of projects, as well as area-wide streetscape design standards that may cost up to \$200,000. Funding for incentives may be reallocated sooner for immediate use by prospective incentive

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applicants, whereas CIP funds will be reallocated once projects and locations are identified.

There currently are seven sitting members on the CCRAB, but only four members attended the special workshop and participated in the group exercise. Randall Klett, a resident and business owner in the area also participated. Participants were provided with four green stickers and asked to prioritize potential improvement projects in the area by placing stickers on project types they deemed most important.

The poll results revealed that the top three project types were roadway lighting (7), pedestrian pathways/sidewalk (6), and traffic calming (4). The advisory board was informed that staff will gather additional feedback on preferred projects from the neighborhoods in the area and the next steps would be to identify the locations where the prioritized projects can be undertaken first.

On February 28, 2024, an online ranking survey was sent to neighborhood associations in and around the subject areas: South Middle River Civic Association, Middle River Terrace Neighborhood Association, Central City Alliance, Poinsettia Heights, and Lake Ridge Civic Association. The survey mirrored the advisory board exercise in gathering feedback on the types of projects the neighbors would like to see accomplished first. Respondents were asked to rank six options in order of importance. Rank 1 as most important and rank 6 as least important. The survey closed on Wednesday – March 13, 2024.

A total of 75 respondents started the survey and only 57 completed it. The data was analyzed using the preferred methodology for ranking. The project types are assigned a numerical value to each ranking: (6) points for top choice, (5) points for second choice, and so forth, down to 1 point for the least choice. Each ranking data is then multiplied by the assigned point value and added to determine the points for each project type. Here are the results that respondents ranked as top priorities.

1	Pedestrian pathways and sidewalk	281 points
2	Roadway Lighting	262 points
3	Landscaping	212 points
4	Traffic Calming Improvements	210 points
5	Underground Utilities	201 points
6	Gateway Markers	94 points


Staff will present the survey results at the next CCRAB meeting on April 3, 2024 as a follow-up to the special workshop. The goal is to obtain a recommendation on project types and priority locations within the area. To select locations, discussion will include a review of existing improvement needs data provided by the Transportation and Mobility Division, and needs input provided by the two major neighborhoods within the Central City area, South Middle River Civic Association and Middle River Terrace Neighborhood Association. Once projects and locations are identified, the justification for CIP funds will enable staff to work through the City's budget amendment process to reallocate the funds to CIP projects.

Staff anticipates submitting a request for the return and reallocation of the CRA fund balance of \$2,334,39 at the CRA Board meeting on May 7, 2024.



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


















Central City CIP Types of improvements Survey

- Most vital is the flood water control improvements in the water drainage and sewage network. More sidewalks for pedestrian safety. Another 3 way stop sign on Dixie Highway and 17th Court.
- As an Officer of Central City Alliance very involved with and concerned with the CRA.
- French drains on Ne 12 terr MUST be connected to storm drains. Constant flooding.
- The lane removals and roadway capacity reductions on 13th Street, NE 4th Ave and other nearby
 roadways and traffic circle on 13th Street have been disastrous, creating tremendous roadway
 congestion, an increase in accidents, and unsafe conditions for pedestrians. With the significant
 amount of development occurring in Fort Lauderdale and increases in population we should be
 moving in the opposite direction and increasing the capacity of our infrastructure and roadways.
- I live in Central Beach Area.
- Yes. Stop destroying the live canopies I'm sure all board members like live canopies around their living area.
- please stop thinking reducing traffic lanes reduces traffic!!!!! A1A north of sunrise used to be 2 lanes each side and someone thought if we would reduce lanes we would have less vehicle traffic. Las olas same thing. now you have 2 lanes going into 1 westbound over the tunnel. Are you crazy!!!! Did a 5 year old or a granny who doesnt drive come up with this??? We have so many new condos and cars and visiors we cannot reduce more available driving area.
- Keep bike lanes free of broken glass, sand and garbage
- I live at the corner of Broward and US1 which I consider the Central City area.
- Leave las olas alone !!!
- There is already a sidewalk plan in place for Fort Lauderdale. It has been around since the sixties. That plan is for sidewalks to be on every street. If Fort Lauderdale is to be treated like a city then it needs to have things that real cities have like sidewalks. The excuses and complaints for years that the commissions have used to not have sidewalks is old and getting on people's nerves. Some people only get around by using a sidewalk or the street. Why keep putting the sidewalk users at risk??? I am disabled and sometimes I use the sidewalks and I use the streets when there isn't a sidewalk. I've been complaining about the lack of sidewalks in Fort Lauderdale for 30 years. It seems the only real way to get a sidewalk In Fort Lauderdale where one isn't is by filing an ADA Title II complaint. But why??? Just think if there had been a standard of above a certain dollar amount of improvements a sidewalk is to be installed on a property along the street{s} most streets would already have a sidewalk some food for thought.

- Need to include Las Olas Isles which includes approx 1200 living units. MOST of us LIVE more than 75% time LIVING here and use the Central City for our our basic support. Alternately our basic transportation routes through the Central City for entry /exit, especially during Emergency conditions. (Hurricane/ Bad weather/Boat Show etc.
- improve bike lanes with raised / divided lanes and complete sidewalks on major streets and also on NE 18th street
- Las Olas and US 1
- Traffic is terrible and these blocked streets were closed years ago for reasons that do not exist anymore. They need to be opened back up!
- Sidewalk lighting on 4th Avenue from 13th Street to in front of the High School.
- Please replace the hideous piece of 'art' in the middle of the round about in Middle River Terrace.
- though I own in MRT and Lake Ridge
- No bldgs over 2 stories
- Past traffic calming efforts, especially on Dixie Highway and NE 16th Street east of NE 4th St while very welcome, have now pushed aggressive drivers and their reckless behavior into the side streets. I live on NE 16th Ct, where drivers now choose to speed off the traffic circle from Dixie Highway. Drivers now take the corner at NE 16th CT and NE 5th Terrace at exceptionally high rates of speed - which jeopardizes the safety of students at Fort Lauderdale High School.
- The NE 5th Terrace between NE 11th street and NE 13 street flooded during heavy rainfall
- If Fort Lauderdale truly wants to become the large, metropolitan city it is growing into, then
 sidewalks should be a priority all over the city (i.e., outside every business, home, etc.).
 Sidewalks are a public safety issue and your aim to improve safety on public streets should
 include sidewalks as a priority!
- Policing is required for the changes city is making to single lane streets now. For instance, Flying
 L Drive (SE 4th) where it goes to one lane now, is a real hazard as drivers are speeding north
 across Sunrise to get ahead of everyone to get into the now single lane (right in front of Home
 Depot). Thank you.
- I would like to see our playground on Dixie Highway expanded to include a pickel ball court; a
 band shell; equipment for autistic children and possibly a farmer's market to make it inclusive for
 all the neighborhood.

- Thank You for considering out ideas and inputs on improving our beautiful city. As we look to
 the future, we should prepare and upgrade all city utilities to support a growing city with greater
 density. I also fully support upgrades to current sidewalks, bike paths and walking paths for a
 sustainable future in Fort Lauderdale.
- Specifics: 1. the bicycle paths should be extended east of the railroad tracks on NE 13th Street, and traffic calmed there. It's very difficult to turn left from NE 11th Ave onto NE 13th Street 2. the beacon at 13th and Dixie needs major work, let's repair it before it degrades further 3. traffic humps should be bike friendly - the ones on NE 11th street west of Publix are awful
- This area has been blighted for years and years. It needs attention desperately.
- Sidewalks. Sidewalks. Sidewalks. These are incredibly necessary. I've seen children and the
 elderly with wallets walking in the middle of the road. This is incredibly unsafe for them and
 drivers. Property taxes in the area have increased, yet basic infrastructure, like sidewalks, is nonexistent. It's even more needed at night because pedestrians walk unlit streets because there are
 no sidewalks. This needs to be a priority. Please make sure that with the city's Sidewalk Master
 Plan that the South Middle River neighborhood is not forgotten or ignored. A median on
 Andrews, from Sunrise to 13th street, planted with native shade trees would help with
 landscaping and calm the speeding that occurs. You could add a nice gateway marker at the
 entrance as well. There's an opportunity for beautification and safety on this stretch of road.



January 31, 2024 SMRCSA Feedback from Christina R.(VP) on Needs

 Reimagine NE 7th Avenue and NE 11th Street by adding sidewalks, improving stormwater drainage, adding traffic calming, adding ornamental street lights, creating street parking where possible, and "reworking" the dogleg and greenspace by the railroad tracks.



 Add a streetscape for NE 12th Street (after the city paves it) by adding sidewalks, lighting, trees, and other amenities.



3) Finish the streetscape on the east end of NE 13th Street by the railroad tracks with the goal of adding more street parking and improving public safety in front of the Archways building. (Adding ornamental street lights, trees, street parking, bike lanes, etc.)



- 4) Hire a consultant to study parking issues on the NE 13th Street corridor and side streets to address whether we need to purchase property to add parking lots or widen/reconfigure streets to allow for more parallel parking.
- 5) Add ornamental streetlights on dark side streets.
- 6) Add trash cans at all intersections.
- Purchase the Archways' surplus building (and parking lot) for redevelopment or use as a community center.
- 8) Sponsor a program to add murals to warehouse walls south of NE 13th Street *and* the wall on NE 11th Street along the north side of the cement company (after removing the bushes)
- Hire a consultant to help the Advisory Board update the CRA's strategic plan (which is overdue) that includes a reasonable density level.
- 10) Create a new business incentive program specifically for art studios and galleries.
